

The Bowman Lake Sailing Association: by Doug Boughton

As I sit here...it does seem like the long cold winter is easing her grip on us, and my thoughts begin to return to warmer pursuits, like sailing.

If you are interested at all in enjoying our lake from the cockpit of a Sunfish, now is a good time to begin looking. Peruse through the Want Ad Digest, or Craigslist, or maybe even EBay for a used boat. I paid \$400 for mine, and Bruce paid less. Both boats needed minor work to get them seaworthy, fairly easy stuff, as in painting, rigging, sail attachment. What's important when looking at a used Sunfish is to examine the hull for cracks,

make sure it isn't waterlogged (both of these maladies can be fixed), look at where the mast inserts in the hull to be sure that portal is still in good shape, and also at where the keel slides down through the hull. The outer cracks are easily dealt with, but cracks inside the mast hole and keel slot can't be so easily, so shy away from any Sunfish that is broken in those two places. If you're not comfortable with your ability to assess a used Sunfish, give me a jingle and I'll go with you to have a look. I also have a pickup that has now carried two Sunfish to their new home on Big Bowman, and I'll be happy to carry yours also.



Quite a few people already have Sunfish at

their camps and homes up here on the lake and hopefully they will pull them out, tune them up, and between those boats and any new ones that show up this year, we can get a little fleet out on the lake. Perhaps we could even get a little casual fun-series started on breezy weekend days, maybe mid-summer after everyone has had some time in their boats to get acclimated to the how-to's of sailing. By the way, if anyone needs a primer, I'd be happy to help you set your boat up and get you started in learning how to sail it, not that I'm an expert by any means. At any rate, I'll be out there whenever the breeze is good and the sun is out. Hope to see some of you out there too.

<u>Beware of Coyotes and Fishers:</u> Anja reports that she and other lake residents have had sightings of both these animals in recent months. She states that the coyotes have been easy to hear at night.





A fisher (left) is part of the weasel family, runs from 7-14 pounds, and 40" long. It has a high pitched screech. It preys on medium sized animals. Coyotes are part of the dog family and can get up to 50 pounds. Their sounds are more like howls and yelps. They tend to prey on small animals and like fruit, compost, and carrion. While both in the wild tend to be wary of people, if food is left out, coyotes can get bolder. It is advised on web sites that domesticated animals not be left out at night, bird feeders be set away from homes, garbage cans be secured, and if you see either animal that you make noise to let them know they are not welcome. Today's paper reported a poodle in Rye, NY, staked to a chain by a populated building was attacked during the day.

Beware of the Tick: According to a local veterinarian, tick-borne diseases such as Lyme disease and anaplasmosis are on the rise. Outdoor pets are particularly susceptible without protection, but people are too. For both diseases, early detection is healthful.

"Our Common Concern Is the Lake:" This quote is from the 1989 Premier Edition of The Bowman Lake Newsletter. In the Newsletter, there was a reminder of the 3 C's: courtesy, consideration, and caring. These three words are just as applicable today as they were 21 years ago. As a small community with a common concern, it falls upon each of us to be mindful of how what we do may affect those around us. In the third edition of the Newsletter, Elbert Hubbard was quoted as saying: "do unto others as though you were the others." I once heard someone say: "disagreements are inevitable among people, but conflicts are optional." It seems to me that if we all use those 3 C's with one another, any disagreements could be resolved without conflict.

On that note, below are the oft reminded "do's and don'ts". Let's all glance over them and try to keep these in mind over the summer.

Suggested Do's and Don'ts

- **-Do** remember to minimize pollution. Don't feed the geese as they create pollution. Don't use fertilizer that is harmful to the lake.
- -Do pull your weeds and dispose of them. Don't leave them floating in the lake because this can actually lead to increased spread of those very weeds you are trying to rid the lake of.
- -Do remind friends and guests to the lake to clean off anything including clothing before putting it in the lake. Anything exposed to milfoil can spread it.
- -Do be considerate of the property of others. Seek permission to cross the land of home and camp owners.
- -Do remember that voices and sounds carry across the lake clearly especially when there are no other ambient noises (like at night). Remember night parties can disturb others who may be on a different schedule than you.
- -Don't bathe in the lake. (Yes, this has been done.)
- -Don't speed on the one lane roads around the lake. Remember our community's children and pets may be at risk, not to mention the rest of us.
- -Do keep any pets under control. There is a Town of Sand Lake leash law for dogs. Please remember that your neighbors may not want to deal with your pet(s).
- -Do have a wonderful summer with lots of fun and enjoy the beauty and friends around you. (I confess, this is my addition.)
